Central European University Diploma in Advanced European Union Legal Practice

July 3 – 22, 2006 Budapest

The 2006 Advanced Course in European Union Legal Practice is offered jointly by the Department of Legal Studies and Summer University of Central European University (CEU), in cooperation with the Total LawTM Team. The program brings together participants from all over the world and from diverse legal backgrounds, i.e. law students near completion of their law degree, law graduates and legal professionals, who are seeking further credentials and experience in the field. It may be particularly appealing to government officials and those aiming at a career in national, international and/or European civil service, and those who wish to apply for jobs in the field of European Union law. The working language of the course is English.

Central European University is a US-style, internationally recognized institution of post-graduate education in the social sciences and humanities, located in the capital city of Hungary, Budapest. Incorporated in the State of New York, CEU is accredited by the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools (in the United States) and by the Hungarian Ministry of Education.

Participants have two enrollment options. Either they opt for the Diploma option, which requires them to register for and pass an examination at the end of the course, and entitles them to receive a course Diploma and CEU academic credits. Or they opt for the Certificate option, which entitles them to receive a Certificate of Participation, provided that they meet the course requirements. Participants who have not studied European Union Law are *required* to enroll in an Introductory Course, which will be organized from June 26—June 30, 2006. This course is also open to participants who wish to update their knowledge in European Union Law.

The advanced course will also enroll a number of CEU LLM students. CEU students have the possibility to enroll in the summer course in two ways. Either they register as external participants, and are subject to the above requirements and options, or they register with the Department of Legal

Studies, opting for the LLM with Specialization in European Union Law, which requires them to complete successfully 8 EU related credits, i.e. 4 CEU Legal Studies Department credits *and* 4 Total LawTM summer course credits.

Course Description:

This *advanced course* is about the practice of European Union Law. Participants receive hands-on insider analysis about the functioning of the European Union. The program is designed to combine seminars on different subjects as well as workshops supporting the topic addressed in these seminars or some aspects thereof.

The Total Law^{IM} teaching team is a unique blend of well-known academics and senior officials working in European Union institutions, who have also written widely in the field. The particular composition of the team gives the seminar and the workshop both that advanced knowledge and the insider view that is so valuable for the participants.

The Total Law^{IM} Method:

The Total Law[™] approach, developed by the Jean Monnet Center at the New York University School of Law, believes in contextualization: situating a legal controversy, a court decision, a Treaty provision, a Directive or a Regulation in its economic, social and political context. The aim is not to make participants amateur economists or political scientists, but rather to give them "another perspective" on the problem. The course will improve the participants' skills by explaining how economic, social and political contexts shape the particular legal problem addressed and impact the thinking about its legal solution. The program will equip participants with the ability to understand the economic, social and political consequences of different legal outcomes. The discipline is Law. The focus is Law. But the premise is that Law cannot be understood, nor practiced professionally and competently, without understanding its broader contexts.

In addition to seminars and workshop, the program includes social and cultural activities, such as various thematic evenings with members of the Total Law™ team (e.g. evening in a typical *kert* bar, wine tasting, karaoke in an Irish pub, or lunch in a traditional *vendeglö*), a visit to the Hungarian Constitutional Court or the Hungarian Parliament, a boat trip to picturesque Szentendre followed by a picnic, a cultural walking tour of Budapest, etc.

The Total Law[™] approach was designed jointly by all members of the team so as to make the parts fit into a coherent whole and to ensure that the different methodological and intellectual approaches practiced in the course all add up so that the whole is greater than the parts. This approach is also used at other universities worldwide.

She graduated from the *Institut d'Etudes Politiques* of Lyon (France), obtained postgraduate degrees in both Law and Political Science from the universities of Lyon III (France), Thessaloniki (Greece) and Montpellier (France) and received a PhD from the University of Exeter. She writes in the fields of EU law and European integration. Her recent publications include: 'When governments go to Luxembourg...: the influence of governments on the European Court of Justice' (2004) 299 *European Law Review* and 'The Future of Europe: judicial interference and preferences' (2005) 1 *Comparative European Politics*.

Petra Bard, S.J.D candidate at CEU.

Petra Bárd is a candidate for S.J.D. at the Central European University in Budapest. She did her studies of law at ELTE Law School, Budapest, and the Humboldt University of Berlin; she earned her LL.M. in international business law at CEU. Currently she is also a lecturer of European Union Law at the École Supérieure des Sciences Commerciales d'Angers, Budapest. She is the Vice-Chairperson of the Hungarian Europe Society, an NGO representing and promoting the idea of a unifying Europe, and the European common values, in Hungary and abroad. Her research and writings focus on the European Constitutional Treaty, the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the EU, and the rights of disabled persons. She participates in monitoring the enforcement of the Charter rights in Hungary in cooperation with the European Network of Independent Experts, a project initiated by the European Commission.

The Total Law™ Team

J.H.H. Weiler is University Professor and holder of the Jean Monnet Chair at the New York University (NYU) School of Law. He serves as Chairman of the NYU Global Law School Program and is Director of the Jean Monnet Center for International and Regional Economic Law & Justice. He is also an Honorary Professor at London University and the University of Copenhagen. Prior to his NYU appointment he was the Manley Hudson Professor of Law and Jean Monnet Chair at Harvard University. He is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is a WTO and NAFTA Panel Member. He is a founding editor of the European Journal of International Law, of the European Law Journal and of the World Trade Review. He writes in the fields of International Law, the Law of the European Union, and Comparative Constitutional Law. His recent publications include: Un'Europa Cristiana: Un saggio esplorativo, (BUR Saggi, Milano, 2003 – translations into Spanish, Polish, Portuguese, German); The European Court of Justice (OUP 2001 with G. de Burca); The EU, the WTO and the NAFTA (OUP, 2000), The Constitution of Europe (CUP, 1998—translated into Spanish, Italian, Slovenian, Serbian, Japanese, Greek, Portuguese, Roumanian), and a Novella, Der Fall Steinmann (Piper, 2000)

José M. de Areilza is Professor of European Union Law and Associate Dean of Legal Studies at the *Instituto de Empresa*, Madrid. He is a Lecturer in the PhD Program in European Studies of the *Instituto Ortega y Gasset* in Madrid and at the William and Mary School of Law Summer Program. Between 1996 and 2000 he was Advisor on European Affairs to the Spanish Prime Minister's Office. During 2003, he advised the Spanish Government Representative at the European Convention. His research focuses on European institutions, flexibility and EU competences. He has published several articles on these issues and has edited and co-authored the books *España y las transformaciones de la Unión Europea* (1998) and *Internet, una profecía* (2002).

Kieran Bradley is Head of Unit in the Legal Service of the European Parliament, Brussels. He has previously served as a *référendaire* at the European Court of Justice, and as an administrator on the secretariat of the European Parliament's Committee on Legal Affairs. In Spring 2000, he was the first Distinguished Lecturer on European Law at Harvard Law School, and he has also taught courses on EC law at the Autonomous University of Barcelona, the East-West Forum (Academy of European Law, Fiesole) and the European Institute of Public Administration, Luxembourg. He has published extensively in a number of areas of EC law, particularly institutional law.

Damian Chalmers is Reader in EU Law at the London School of Economics and Political Science. Prior to that he was a lecturer at the University of Liverpool, and was on the Management Committee of the AIRE Center for 4 years. He has held visiting appointments at Copenhagen, Lund, Helsinki, Michigan, Instituto de Empresa and Fudan (PRC). He is currently editor of the *European Law Review* and the *EU Jurist* website. His recent publications include "The Reconstitution of Europe's Public Spheres" (2003) 9 *European Law Journal*; "Food for Thought: European Risks and National Ways of Life" (2003) 66 *Modern Law Review*; "The Much Ado about Judicial Politics in the United Kingdom" (2000) *Harvard Jean Monnet Paper* 2000/1; "The Mistakes of the 'Good European'" in Fredman (ed). *Human Rights: The Case of Racism* (OUP, 2001). He is also the author of *EU Law* (Ashgate, 1998).

Miguel Poiares Maduro is Advocate General at the European Court of Justice in Luxembourg. He is a Professor of European and International Law at the Universidade Nova de Lisboa. He received his doctorate from the European University Institute (EUI, Florence) where he was also a Research Assistant and Fellow. He is also an external Professor at the Instituto Ortega y Gasset (Madrid), the London School of Economics and the Institute of European Studies of Macao (China). He has been Fulbright Visiting Research Scholar at Harvard Law School. He is Co-director of the Academy of International Trade Law (Macao). He co-edited with Joseph Weiler the "Special Book Review Issue" of the European Law Journal. He is currently co-editor with Francis Snyder of the Hart Publishers Series Studies in European Law and Integration. He was the first winner of the Rowe and Maw Prize and winner of the Prize Obiettivo Europa (for the best PhD thesis at the EUI). He is the author of We the Court--The European Court of Justice and the European Economic Constitution (Hart Publishing, 1997).

Imola Streho, the Coordinator of the Total Law^{IM} Team, is *référendaire* in the cabinet of the Estonian Judge and previously worked in the cabinet of the French Advocate General at the European Court of Justice in Luxembourg. She is teaching seminars on the European Judicial System and the Law of the International Market at University of Paris II (Assas - *Institut des Hautes Etudes Internationales*). From 2000 to 2002, she was a visiting researcher at Harvard Law School and NYU School of Law where she was the Executive Director of its Jean Monnet Center. She holds a diploma from the College of Europe. She writes in the field of EU law. Her recent publications include: "Fundamental Principles vs. Fundamental Rights, comment on the ECJ decision Schmidberger, C-112/00" (2003-2004) 1, and "on the ECJ decision Omega, C-36/02" (2003-2004) 4, *RAE / Law & European Affairs*, and "Regional Organizations' Judicial System Compared: Is the European Model Transposable and Should It Be?" (2004) 27 *Review of Asian Pacific Studies*.

Enrollment Options:

Option 1. CEU Diploma in Advanced European Union Legal Practice

Law students near completion of their law degree, law graduates and legal professionals who, at the time of enrollment, register for the examination, will receive a CEU Certificate of Participation, and, if they pass the examinations, a CEU Diploma in Advanced European Union Legal Practice and a CEU transcript with transferable credits. Students are advised to check on credit transferability at their home institution prior to applying to this program.

Option 2. CEU Certificate of Participation

Law students near completion of their law degree, law graduates and legal professionals who choose, at the time of enrollment, not to take the examination, will receive a Certificate of Participation. Such participants will not receive credits.

CEU current LLM students who opted for the 'LLM with specialization' and successfully completed the 4 EU related credits at CEU Legal Studies Department *and* the Total Law™ Summer Course will receive a Diploma entitled 'LLM in IBL/CCL/HR with Specialization in European Union Law', in addition to a Certificate of Participation. The CEU LLM students who did not choose this option are subject to the same conditions as external participants.

Introductory Course

Participants who have not previously studied European Union Law are *required* to enroll in an Introductory Course in European Union Law, which will be organized from June 26—June 30, 2006.

Academic Requirements, Credits, Examination and Grading:

All participants enrolled in the Advanced Course are required to attend all the sessions.

The examination will be scheduled on Saturday, July 22, 2006. It will be in the form of an open-book, computer-based examination, conducted in the computer laboratories of CEU, under supervision. Participants will receive a set of questions at the start of the examination. The submitted examinations will be graded by the individuals who taught the Advanced Course. The Coordinator of Total LawTM Team will harmonize the grades, according to the CEU grading system.

Each session awards 1 credit (except the Introductory Course), resulting in altogether 4 credits. Participants who take *and* pass the examination at the end of the course will receive a CEU transcript, with the US equivalent of 4 legal credits (a CEU legal credit equals 700 minutes of teaching. Law school students should check at their home institutions about the transfer of credit policies before applying to this program.)

Accommodation in Budapest:

Participants in the program will be offered accommodation at the CEU Residence and Conference Center (http://www.ceu.hw/facilities.html#2) on a 'first come - first served' basis. The residential fee includes the cost of accommodation and breakfast. Participants may also make their own individual arrangements for accommodation.

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Admissions Requirements:

To be admitted in the Advanced Course, all participants must have earned a first degree in law, or be near completion of their law degree, and must have a prior knowledge of European Union Law. Participants who have never studied European Union Law are *required* to enroll in the Introductory Course, which will be organized from June 26 to June 30, 2006.

Participants who are not native speakers of English must be proficient in the English language. They must complete the self-evaluation section of the application form

The minimum enrollment required for the course is 20 participants.

CEU LLM students interested in the 'LLM with specialization' option should inquire at the Department of Legal Studies.

- 5. A letter of justification for those applying for financial aid and/or scholarship.

Deadline for Receipt of Applications: February 14, 2006

Interested candidates are strongly advised to submit their application as soon as possible in view of the limited number of places available. Late applications will be considered as far as possible, depending on the number of places left on the course.

Admitted participants will be notified by e-mail by the end of March 2006. In the cases where participants need to obtain a Hungarian visa, CEU will provide the necessary documents to start the process as early as possible. Participants will be expected to confirm their acceptance of the offer within 10 days.

For Enrollment Option 2 (Certificate of Participation):

Introductory Course in European Union Law (where required):

For all Enrollment Options: 250 Euro

The tuition fee also includes some administrative costs, an orientation program and welcome pack, access to the CEU Library and IT facilities, reading materials, printing quota, and some social activities. Participants should expect to contribute some costs toward additional social events.

The tuition fee is normally payable in full upon confirmation of acceptance of the CEU offer of a place of study in the advanced course. However, staggered payment can be arranged on a case-by-case basis for those participants who cannot pay the full fee at the time they confirm acceptance, providing that they pay a minimum of 20% tuition fees at the time of confirmation.

In the event of cancellation, CEU will refund the tuition fee as follows:

For cancellations before May 15, 2006—full refund

For cancellations after May 15, 2006—80% of the tuition fee.

For withdrawals from the program once courses have started, CEU will refund only the sessions which have not started at the time of the participant's withdrawal.

Scholarships and Financial Support

CEU may offer up to four full scholarships, one for citizens of North American countries, one for citizens of Western European countries, one for citizens of Central and Eastern European countries and one for citizens from the rest of the world.

In addition to these full scholarships, financial support in the form of a partial tuition waiver may be awarded at CEU's discretion, on the basis of merit. Participants interested in one of the scholarship and/or tuition waiver should mark the relevant boxes in the Application Form and provide a letter of justification.

Health Insurance (Enrollment Options 1 and 2): 32 Euro

Health insurance is mandatory for all participants. The Health Insurance Fee is payable upon arrival at CEU, on the first day of the course. If participants have their own international health insurance, they must submit a copy of their membership card to the CEU Summer University Office in advance. International participants who cannot present a proof of health insurance valid in Hungary will be required to enroll in the CEU Health Plan.
